Workshops and Leaders

Hakim Bellamy Performing Creative Non-Fiction: The Art of the Historical & the Research Poem

In this workshop (offered twice) we will look at crafting the historical into the accessible. We will examine 3 historical accounts, let the participants choose one to workshop and then tell a story, in poem, that tells *that* history with perspective, emotion, and power. Participants will have the added option of using an account besides the 3 ideas offered in the workshop as long as they are knowledgeable of the fact and fiction surrounding the account. This workshop will allow participants to leave with a good sense of poetic license (the line between fact and fine storytelling) as well as how to perform critical historical information in a way that will not put audiences to sleep (even if they are already familiar with the historical account that headlines the poem). This workshop is great for poets who like to write about newsworthy events past, present, or future.

Hakim Bellamy is a two-time poetry slam national champion. He was a member of the 2005 National Poetry Slam Champs, Team Albuquerque in 2005, his first year of poetry slam, and of the College Unions Poetry Slam Invitational Champs, Team UNM in 2006. He won City Grand Slam Championships in Albuquerque (2005) and in Silver City (2008), as well as 3 consecutive University of New Mexico LOBOSLAM titles.

Bellamy's poetry has been published in Albuquerque inner-city buses as a winner of the RouteWords Competition (2005). Between 2006 and 2011, his work appeared in the *Harwood Anthology, Earthships Anthology, Sin Fronteras Journal*, *A Bigger Boat* (published by UNM Press), *Looking Back at Place, Malpais Review*, and *How to...Multiple Perspectives on Creating a Garden, a Life, Relationships and Community*. For his work as a community organizer and journalist, he received a UNM Paul Bartlett Re Peace Prize honorable mention in 2007.

Bellamy has acted for both stage and screen, and makes more music with his poetry nowadays as a songwriter, emcee, and vocalist. He won the honor of "Best Poet" by popular vote in contests run by both the *Local iQ* and the *Alibi* (Smart List 2010 & 2011). The proud father of a 3-year-old miracle, he regularly works with youth poets via presentations at schools, nonprofits, and community organizations across the state of New Mexico. Charles Trumbull Haiku: Can This Little Thing Really Be a Poem?

In this 90-minute workshop (offered twice), Charles Trumbull will compare and contrast haiku with Westernstyle poems. After hearing a few words about the evolution, content, and structure of English-language haiku, participants will be encouraged to write and discuss a few of their own.

Charles Trumbull is retired from editing and publishing positions at the U.S. National Academy of Sciences, Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty, and *Encyclopaedia Britannica*. A past president of the Haiku Society of America, he has served since 2006 as editor of *Modern Haiku*, the oldest journal of haiku and haiku studies outside Japan.

Rhyme Royal (Session 1) and Ghazal (Session 2)

In these two workshops, we will investigate the utility and delight of forms and play with them by writing in form. For those attending the first, we will conduct a fast-paced study of Rhyme Royal, a seven-line form favored by Scottish King James I. In the second, we will study the ghazals (rhymes with muzzles) of the ghazal master, Agha Shahid Ali. Potentially, attendees will exit each workshop with a draft of a poem in the form discussed in the respective workshops.

Merimée arrived in the Land of Enchantment in 1970, raised her children in Albuquerque, and earned an MA in Creative Writing from UNM in 2002. She co-edits *the Rag* and co-hosts *Duke City Dimestories*, a prose open mic. Her work appears in most of the NM journals and reviews and in several national publications. She lives with her two dogs and her husband, teaches singletons at CNM, hosts family and friends and traveling poets in her home, and loves the sprawling, growing, organic nature of the local poets' and writers' community.
